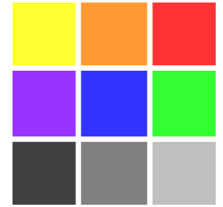

CBC Members;

I respectfully request the Congressional Black Caucus consider the Juneteenth celebration for 2020 to be the final opportunity for the members of the Caucus to claim leadership in calling Black Americans into service to deliberate the better organization of government for the United States.

1. Upon the passing of the Juneteenth celebration the Secular Library will be inclined to campaign for the general participation in the reordering of the United States chartering system.
2. In any event please consider my offer to provide introductory guidance to the Secular Library Chartering System template designed to guide legal firms to begin deliberations of a six-part government separation model for the replacement of the erroneous unformulated subsisting United States chartering system.
3. I am very happy to make a presentation to those who would be inclined to understand and advance the SLCS template to a practical petition for state or federal sanctioned court processing. I will not entertain questions from persons not inclined to understand and advance the template unless segregated from the more helpful audience.
4. SLCS templates will be made available in several editable software formats free of charge. Fees that are charged for the use of the copyrighted template will not be charged until after a sanctioned court initiates the subsequent court hearing series (convention) exercising the SLCS template in its unique advanced drafting for the jurisdiction the anticipated charter is intended to serve.
5. All formed legal firms considering exercising the SLCS template will require at least one state sanctioned notary attorney to file the advanced template for court processing, and archiving for the legal firm's organization.
6. Please be advised that objection to the exercise of the SLCS for chartering government entities by Black Americans based on racial preference of document generation is absurd until Black Americans produce a government reform model free of white people's influence. Casual observation of the current segmented political campaign for Black Americans grievances continues to not publish anything that suggests that Black Americans are suspicious of the serviceability of the subsisting three-part government model that was seemingly designed exclusively by white men, and are inclined to continue exercising the erroneous system in service to enforce their government reform proposals; which have probably been composed in compromise with white people who may be adversely effected by the intimidation strategies of violent rebellions.
